

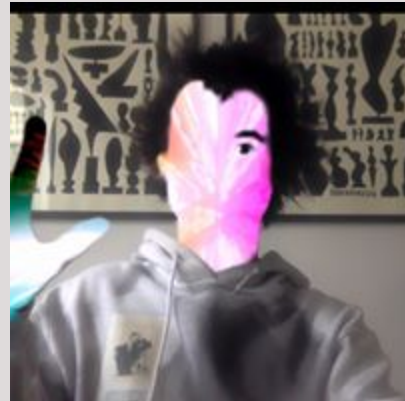

Queens Memory's COVID-19 Project Enters Phase 2

Thanks to the tireless efforts of our volunteers and staff and the amazing generosity of the people of Queens, our [Queens Memory COVID-19 Project](#) is an overwhelming success! Our borough-wide archiving campaign to collect first-person stories of life in the epicenter of the pandemic has been collecting an amazing variety of photos, videos, interviews, written texts and artwork testifying to the struggles and resiliency of our communities.

More than 340 items are now viewable through our tech partner, Urban Archive, with more being uploaded regularly. 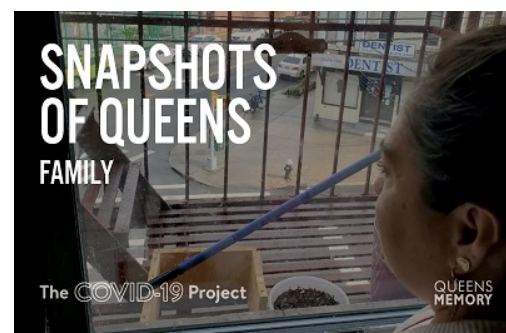

Coming up next will be the premiere of our 10-episode **Queens Memory Podcast**. To start off the series, Queens neighbors share their stories of living in quarantine -- the fear, isolation, adjustment and loss that have touched everyone since the beginning of COVID-19. Ann Hepperman of Jackson Heights contracted the virus in March and shares her story of strength in the face of uncertainty, while Ridgewood resident Hendel Leiva speaks of his friend who was lost to COVID-19. Residents of Elmhurst and Astoria share what it's like to live near hospitals during a pandemic, while others tell stories of managing at home. Host Meral Agish guides listeners through first-hand accounts of Queens residents who each have their own experience to tell, while also sharing a common trait -- resilience.

Every Tuesday at 4 pm EST, we will present a new video in our series, **What Shapes Our Communities: Talks with Local Businesses, Organizations, and Artists**. The following discussions will stream on the [Queens Memory Facebook page](#):

July 28 – We will talk to [Jaime Sunwoo](#), an Artist Commissioning Program Awardee in Playwriting, from the Queens Council on the Arts. Her most recent work, "Specially Processed American Me," is an autobiographical performance that explores how SPAM, the "American" canned meat, has influenced Asian culture and cuisine.

August 11 – We will talk to [Edjo Wheeler](#), Executive Director of the newly established Culture Lab LIC and a member of LIC-A's Board of Directors. Located at the Plaxal Gallery in Long Island City, [Culture Lab LIC](#) is focused on supporting the development and growth of artists, musicians, actors and their local community. August 18 – We will talk to [Loycent Gordon](#), the owner of Neir's Tavern. Opened in Woodhaven in 1829, Neir's Tavern is one of the oldest bars in NYC and has become a center of community for its neighbors. Having faced potential shutdowns before, this bar's community has rallied together to ensure that Neir's Tavern lives on to see its 200th anniversary, and beyond.

July 30, August 27, September 24 – What music is on your playlist right now? What keeps you going and inspires you? Join host EunWoo Nam for one of our [International Open Mic](#) sessions and hear performers from all over the world sharing their stories, singing their favorite songs and reading poetry that inspires them during this extraordinary time. August 4 – Join us for an important panel discussion, [NYC's Immigrants in Crisis: The Effects of COVID-19 on Immigrant Communities](#). The Center for an Urban Future and NY Immigration Coalition recently released a report titled "Under Threat and Left Out: NYC's Immigrants and the Coronavirus Crisis," which explores how immigrant communities have been shut out from government assistance programs during COVID-19, which has led to financial, food, educational and health instability. As the report notes, immigrants comprise almost half of the city's essential workers, but their voices are often not added to the discussion. Our conversation will talk about what conditions prior to COVID-19 have led to these instabilities for immigrant communities during the pandemic, what has been the effect of COVID-19 on immigrant communities, what have been the barriers to receiving assistance, and what policies should be employed to better assist our immigrant communities. The panel will be moderated by Ana Chapman, Director of Adult Learning at Queens Public Library, and will feature Anu Joshi of the New York Immigration Coalition as well as Jonathan Bowles and Eli Dvorkin of the Center for an Urban Future.
