
Third Season Planned for Queens Memory Podcast; Now Hiring!

The Queens Public Library is producing a third season of the **Queens**Memory Podcast! This season's theme centers on the lived experiences of Asian communities in Queens, and we will dedicate each episode to a different Asian American population living in the borough. Each episode will be produced in English and in a common language of the community represented in that episode. This season is made possible by a generous grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

For each of these focused episodes, we will hire a bilingual producer to deliver two 20-minute versions of the episode (one in English, one in an Asian language), telling the story of the political, economic and other factors that led to that group's settlement in Queens. The eight languages featured will be: Bangla, Hindi, Korean, Mandarin, Nepali, Tagalog, Tibetan and Urdu. Each episode will engage in intergenerational storytelling, the use of personal narrative to discuss broader themes, the presence of the #StopAsianHate movement in Queens, and the inclusion of staff and volunteers working for direct service and advocacy organizations serving each community of focus.

Work begins November 2021 and new episodes will drop weekly starting in mid-April 2022. Each bilingual producer will collaborate with the season's executive producer and executive editor to develop the storyline and content of their episode. The team is additionally supported by a composer, bilingual voice talent, and an engineer tasked with ensuring technical excellence. All interviews captured in the creation of the podcast will become part of the Queens Memory Project's archival collections, held at the Queens Public Library.

throughout Mexico, from midnight of October 31 through November 2, the spirits of our deceased loved ones cross over from the spiritual world into the living world to rejoin their family and friends for a time of remembrance and festivity. For their honored guests, the living families make an *ofrenda* (altar), decorated with colorful *papel picado*, *pan de muerto*, *cempasuchiles* (marigolds), sugar skulls, incense and things that the deceased enjoyed during their time living.

Micailhuitl translates to Día de Muertos (Day of the Dead) in Nahuatl, one of

There will be a community *ofrenda* and explanation of the significance of what's placed there. Attendees are encouraged to bring framed photos of deceased loved ones and white candles for the *ofrenda*, and to paint their faces as either a sugar skull or regular skull (completely optional!).




