## Queens Name Explorer Spotlights Landscape Architect and Community Advocate from Far Rockaway





## Meet Our Citi Fellow Lori Rothstein

Lori Rothstein is a student in the Graduate School of Library and Information Science at Queens College, specializing in archival science. Lori has worked as a newspaper journalist and is currently an editor at RILM Abstracts of Music Literature, a database of scholarly writings on music based at the CUNY Graduate Center.

A former resident of Forest Hills and later Douglaston, Lori revisited Douglaston and Little Neck this summer to photograph sites for Queens Name Explorer (QNE). She is continuing her work with QNE as part of her fellowship. She is also exploring the Queens Public Library digital archives to generate social media content highlighting the collection and is learning how to edit audio transcripts for the Queens Memory oral history project.

Outside of the fellowship, Lori is continuing her research project for Professor Johnathan Thayer's Public History course at Queens College. Her work focuses on documenting the Black community in Flushing in the late 19th century, based on federal censuses and historical newspapers from the QPL Archives. Her results to date, and foundational research by a previous Queens College Public History class to document the Old Towne of Flushing Burial Ground, are posted on the Queens Memory website.
