Despite a rainy start to the day, more than 50 people took up the challenge of our Elmhurst Scavenger Hunt last Saturday (October 21)!




Colorful signs and balloons marked each of the stops, which included Robert R. Tilitz Street, Reverend James Pennington Place, Janta-Polczynska Polish

the hunt.






Queens Name Explorer map.




Meet Our New CUNY Interns!

In addition, Milbrodt co-taught a pre-conference workshop, "Choose Your Own Adventure: A Metadata Assessment Tool for Oral History Projects."

If so, join us for How We Name the City, which uses the naming of New York City's roads, bridges and civic institutions as a unique window into urban social structure and the city's ever-changing inhabitants and legal structures. Drawing from her book Naming Gotham: The Villains, Rogues, and Heroes Behind New York Place Names, CUNY Law Professor Rebecca Bratspies will introduce the Revolutionary War figures, civil rights heroes, robber barons, and Tammany Hall politicos whose names grace much of our infrastructure, and will use their lives to gain an understanding of New York's history. This event, to be held at the Forest Hills Library, will feature Professor Bratspies along with representatives from the Topography Department of Queens Borough President Donovan Richards Jr.'s office, who will explain the current process for proposing honorary street names.
