On September 28 we joined New York Climate Exchange to host "Remember Ida: a 3rd Anniversary Podcast Listening Session and Reflection Circle" on Governors Island. The day included listening to an episode from the third season of the Queens Memory Podcast about a family in Flushing



who drowned in their basement home during the storm. After the listening session, a discussion with climate justice experts, researchers, educators, and audience members took place.

The program will focus on using documentary and topographical poetry to activate histories and archives, specifically that of the Queens Name Explorer project. Within the workshop, participants will learn about documentary and topographical poetry, read and discuss an example of each, and receive prompts to begin at least one poem inspired by the people and places found in the Queens neighborhood of Jackson Heights. November 14 – Bring your climate stories to Flushing Library for Climate Action: How to Prepare for Flooding in Northeast Queens. This climate discussion panel, which will be held in English with Mandarin interpretation, brings together diverse perspectives on the impacts of rain-based flooding events and subsequent responses from local residents, researchers, community organizations, and city agencies. During this program, we hope to share personal experiences and explore practical solutions that will help

our neighbors become more prepared to weather extreme rain events in the future. Food and beverages will be served at 5:30 pm, and the panel will last from 6 to 7 pm, followed by audience Q&A. Queens Memory is currently in production on the fourth season of its award-winning podcast, which will focus on the borough's changing climate and water issues. This event will be recorded and archived, and portions of the audio may be used for the podcast. (5:30 - 7 pm EST) November 21 – Join us online for <u>Learn More About the Queens Memory</u> <u>Project</u>, an opportunity to hear about the work we do with volunteers and community partners across the borough. The Queens Memory team will

provide an overview of our programs and cover the many ways you can help as a volunteer and contribute to the Queens Public Library's archival collections. Hear about opportunities to record interviews with Queens residents, contribute photos and other materials, assist with transcription and audio editing, and help with our outreach and programming.
